# Helping Seniors Thrive: The Gift of Aging with Grace

Shirley has spent her entire life in Frederick County. She was married to her husband, Gerald "Jerry," for more than 50 years and together they raised a son, Gerald Jr. When her husband passed away two years ago, it was clear she was starting to decline cognitively and physically. Her son said that the grief from losing her husband coupled with the onset of dementia was causing her to spiral. And then she started attending Daybreak Adult Day Services and they both found relief.

"My mom is a people person, she loves to be around people and she's very talkative," Gerald Jr. says. "Daybreak has really helped her. She was going downhill after my father passed away, I could see her getting worse and worse. Now she spends time at Daybreak and the tables have turned, it has helped her so much."

Christina Forbes has been the executive director at Daybreak since 2012. She said they provide daytime services to seniors including activities, meals, transportation, medical support, structured programming, and support groups. Daybreak serves an average of 50–60 clients a day.

"Shirley sometimes just sits and chats. Even if she's not engaged in an activity it's still stimulation and better than sitting home alone watching ty," Christina says. "I can see a physical change when people start coming here, it's a special energy that each person contributes to in their own special way. It's a loving community and it's really special to be a part of it."

Frederick County's aging population is growing and because seniors are living longer, the need for services is increasing in breadth and depth. The Community Foundation provided Daybreak with \$49,000 to help subsidize fees for individuals receiving services.

"The data speaks for itself. We have a lot of people that make too much to qualify for government services but not enough to pay privately for the services they need," Christina says. "This grant helps us provide financial aid for a senior to attend, which keeps families afloat as they ensure their loved ones have the support they need."

Gerald Jr., who worked for Frederick County Public Schools for 40 years, says Shirley continues to live independently in the home she shared with her husband but looks forward to her days at Daybreak.

"I call her every morning and I can tell the days she is going to Daybreak because she's up and dressed and done breakfast and ready for the bus to pick her up," Gerald Jr. laughed.

"I'm almost in tears talking about it because I'm so relieved that she has found a community for herself there."

When a senior needs support, there are often ripple effects that impact loved ones and caregivers. Christina says that programs like Daybreak provide relief for caregivers as well.

"I can carry on with my life knowing that those three days a week she is in a safe environment where she is comfortable and doing things she likes," Gerald Jr. says. "I'm also a senior, so it gives me time to take care of myself and makes it so that when we do spend time together, we can enjoy each other."

# WERTHEIMER HONOREES RECOGNIZED FOR COMMUNITY SERVICE

Janice Miller Wertheimer was a well-known Frederick County businesswoman and a prolific volunteer. She created several funds with the Community Foundation and provided funding to support the good work people do in our community. The Janis Miller Wertheimer Endowment Fund supports the Community Foundation's annual Wertheimer community service awards, honoring individuals for their sweat equity rather than their financial contribution to the local community. Thanks to Mrs. Wertheimer's commitment to enhancing life in Frederick County the Community Foundation has honored 55 adults and 15 youths with the Wertheimer award since the program was created. Dozens of new funds have been created and numerous existing funds have grown as a result of the Wertheimer awards. What a beautiful legacy for an amazing woman! **ELAINE JUNKER** has been a volunteer with Frederick Health Hospice for 28 years. She has logged close to 8,000 volunteer hours and has spent time with more than 450 patients. Beyond giving her time, she has also personally raised more than \$95,000 for the organization through her Handmade for Hospice knitted pieces. She has also volunteered with Frederick County Landmarks and has been active in the Frederick Woman's Civic Club for 16 years, in addition to serving as a volunteer

and mentor at the Friends of the Child Advocacy Center since 2010. With her award, Elaine is creating **THE ELAINE JUNKER HOSPICE ENRICHMENT FUND** to support Frederick Health Hospice as it provides care and comfort to patients and their families.

SHIRLEY SHORES is best known for her work as the Brunswick Ecumenical Assistance Committee on Needs (BEACON) treasurer and administrator of the Emergency Relief Fund, positions she has held since the organization's inception in 2006. Shirley served on the board of Frederick County Coalition for the Homeless (now known as Frederick County Continuum of Care Collaborative) and served as a trustee of The Community Foundation of Frederick County. She is also active with American Legion Post 96 Brunswick and Grace Episcopal Church. With her award, Shirley is contributing to THE BRUNSWICK EMERGENCY RELIEF FUND to benefit Brunswick area residents who are facing financial emergencies.



**CAITLYN LEE LEWIS**, a student at Phoenix Recovery Academy, serves her community by volunteering in various addiction treatment groups and centers across Frederick County. She uses this time to share her experiences, strengths, and hopes with individuals battling addiction, to understand and explore a different path in life. When she is speaking in the treatment centers, she is kind, caring, compassionate, and provides active listening to adults who are experiencing setbacks and struggling

with their recovery. With her Wertheimer Youth in Action award, Caitlyn will provide a grant to Heartly House, Inc. in support of its mission.

In their season of tragedy, Pam and Don turned to the Community Foundation to create The Dustin and Courtney Muse Fund.

This fund, built with overwhelming community love and support, honored the legacy of Dustin and Courtney by supporting youth athletes and musicians. Seven years and many seasons later, a local family—Tom and Renee Diethrich and their five children—turned to

the Community Foundation with a dream. The Diethrich boys were passionate about music, but with only one income supporting the family, private music lessons were out of reach. In 2013, they applied for support through the Community Foundation and were awarded grants over the ensuing years from The Dustin and Courtney Muse Fund for drum, piano, guitar, and voice lessons. Those music lessons had a profound impact on the family.
